The Rural Services Network

The Rural Services Network (RSN) seeks to maintain and, where possible, improve rural services in England.

The Rural Service Network:

- makes representations on issues affecting rural service
- forms a network between service providers and across sectors
- establishes and broadcasts rural best practice

The Network comprises over 100 Local Authorities (SPARSE Rural) and 110 Non Local Authority Service Bodies (Rural Services Partnership Ltd) and has Associate (Significant Rural) and Affiliate (Private Sector) Groups. Adequate recognition of the additional cost of provision of rural services in the countryside is an important issue for the Network. The Network was instrumental in the formation of the All Party Parliamentary Group on Rural Services in Parliament. It involves 66 Parliamentarians.

The Network is believed to be unique in Europe and seeks to foster constructive debate on all English rural service issues. Its weekly email newsletter on rural news and comment goes out to some 45,000 people in service and consumer groups. At grass roots level, we have a Community Group comprising 4,000 Local Councils, 3,000 Schools and 500 other rural organisations. "Calls for Evidence" and questionnaires seek to provide operating experience, best practice and collective rural viewpoints.

This information is disseminated and available through our widely respected website (www.rsnonline.org.uk). The group provides services through membership subscription and contract revenue and does not seek or receive any Government grant.

Devon County Council

The health and wellbeing of people living in rural areas is a high priority for Devon County Council and its partners as Devon is the third largest county in England. It is also the seventh most sparsely populated county, with a few large settlements and a dispersed rural population, covering Dartmoor National Park and part of Exmoor National Park. Over 90% of its land area is defined as "rural" (settlements <10,000). Of the approximately 750,000 people living in Devon (excluding Plymouth and Torbay), 52% live in rural areas. This figure for Devon is significantly higher than the regional (34%) and national (19%) rural averages with South Hams, West Devon, Mid Devon and Torridge having the highest proportions of the population living in rural areas.

The Devon Joint Strategic Needs Assessment has identified that the real challenges faced by many people living in rural areas include:

- deprivation (including pockets of hidden deprivation)
- a growing ageing population
- small, sparsely distributed populations
- changing population patterns, including outward migration of young people
- social isolation and social exclusion
- lack of affordable housing and fuel poverty
- poor infrastructure, access issues and a lack of health and related services
- a shrinking skilled workforce
- specific health needs associated with some population subgroups

It is against this backcloth that Devon County Council, working closely with eight district, borough and city councils and two Clinical Commissioning Groups, seeks to commission services which offer best value and have the greatest positive impact on the health and wellbeing of local people.
